Industrial action update

Junior doctors who are members of the British Medical Association (BMA) and Hospital Consultants and Specialists Association (HCSA) will take part in industrial action from 7am on Thursday 27 June to 7am on Tuesday 2 July.

On these days, junior doctors in Derbyshire will have the opportunity and personal choice to go on strike for all or some of the time.

Our key messages to the public during industrial action include:

- If you have not been contacted by the NHS, please attend your appointment as planned.
- Please use health services wisely, use <u>111 online</u> as the first port of call for health needs and only using 999 if it is a life-threatening emergency.
- Take simple steps to look after yourselves, loved ones and check in on vulnerable family members and neighbours.
- It is really important that patients who need urgent medical care continue to come forward as normal, especially in emergency and life-threatening cases when

someone is seriously ill or injured, or their life is at risk. A&E, ambulance and 999 services in Derby and Derbyshire will remain available during the industrial action.

 People in mental health distress should continue to seek support as normal. Mental health crisis services will be running during the industrial action, as will the Derbyshire Mental Health Helpline and Support Service (0800 028 0077). Learning disability week

<u>Learning Disability Week 2024</u> takes place from 17 to 23 June. The NHS in Derbyshire wants to remind people with a learning disability about the importance of annual physical health checks.

Whooping cough rates increase

Whooping cough rates have risen sharply in recent months. Babies who are too young to start their vaccinations are at greatest risk.

Vaccination is the best defence against whooping cough. The whooping cough vaccine is given as part of the routine childhood vaccination schedule in the UK at 8, 12 and 16 weeks of age with a booster offered preschool. This programme provides good protection against severe disease but protection after vaccination and disease will wane over time.

Two Generations homeshare service

The Two Generations homeshare service matches people who live alone (typically older people or those with disabilities) and have a spare room, with younger people who can provide an overnight presence, companionship and help with household chores.

Homeshare is suitable for anyone who feels isolated and less independent as years go by and Two Generations' Homeshares work alongside and complement existing care provision, contributing to the preventative, community-based agenda.

The vaccine reduces your risk of becoming seriously unwell with covid.
