1.	Welcome, introductions and apologies	
	Sarah opened the meeting. Everyone introduced themselves. 2.	Matt Harrison, Thomas Pocklington Trust – Sight Loss Council	
	Matt is an Engagement Manager for the Thomas Pocklington Trust which funds the Sight Loss Councils. Matt gave some background. The council is in the process of recruiting 12 blind / partially sighted volunteers aged 18+ in the Derbyshire area. The aim of the council will be to address local and national issues and to make services as accessible as possible. Recruitment has been underway for a couple of months already and the council is due to launch in the next 2 – 3 weeks. A 'listening month' is held every 2 years with the aim to re-assess what is important to residents with sight loss – this helps to drive the charity's	

objectives. The three priorities at the moment are Accessible Public Transport, Environment and Health.

The next listening month will be in the autumn this year. Other areas which are considered on a regular basis include retail, arts and culture and the charity also works with local government, health service, museums, gyms etc.

Pocklington Trust also provide Vision Awareness sessions for groups including sighted guiding, simulation glasses etc. They can also undertake premises audits and mystery shopping tasks too.

3. Thinking Place Long term plan for towns – Michael Rich

Michael joined the meeting to share information about the Long Term Plan for Towns project. Chesterfield is one of 75 towns which will benefit from £20m funding over 10 years to encourage a long term approach to regenerating town centres. A consultation survey is currently being run to encourage residents to give their feedback and suggestions: https://bit.ly/3X6VELH
Three key areas which are being considered as part of the project are Safety and Security, High Streets Heritage and Regeneration and Transport and connectivity. Funding will be 75% capital (i.e. one-off costs) and 25% revenue (i.e. ongoing running services / costs)

Once the feedback has been collated it will then be presented to the project Board for further consideration.

Suggestions / comments made by the forum, which Michael will forward onto the Board, were:

- The artists impression on the presentation show the bollards as being the same colour as the pavement. This would cause an issue for those with a sight disability.
- Nottingham train station bollards have been implemented but haven't considered vision loss.
- Is there scope for social / affordable housing in the town centre?
- If there is increased accommodation in the town centre then there will need to be services and facilities close by, e.g. community hubs
- If less retail will be needed in town centres over the next 10 years it would be good to introduce a whole range of housing options to the town centre rather than just apartments.
- Need to continue to ensure good transport links and cycle routes into town
- Could the visitor centre be re-opened if people are being attracted into town as a result of the project?
- Consideration is needed regarding how to attract new businesses to open shops in the town centre.
- There is a problem with the linkage from the town centre to the retail parks, routes can be long and unpleasant. Could a shuttle bus be considered? A ramp / steps down to The Range would be useful. Links between infrastructure is key.
- Parking is very expensive in the town centre, could there be a free parking offer?
- Waiting times for buses are often lengthy.

- Road crossings are not always consistent (e.g. sound / no sound, where the 'green man' is situated)
- Tactile paving is not always consistent, e.g. area near to the Salvation Army shop.
- Karen Lawson has some footage which shows people navigating around the town centre which she will share with Michael.
- Could the Arts Trail be made more inclusive (e.g. use of braille, beacons)

4. 2024-25 event planning discussion:

Support for carers (working with Derbyshire Carers)

Following the planning meeting earlier in the year, contact has been made with Heather Aitken from Derbyshire Carers who has kindly agreed to work with the Forum to plan a drop-in support for carers event which will take place in the early Autumn in the town centre.
